#### Alfio Leotta

Alfio is a scholar and film-maker based in Te Whanganui-a-Tara Wellington. Alfio has written several books that deal with topics such as New Zealand cinema, fantasy cinema and the relationship between film and tourism. Alfio is also an award-winning filmmaker who produced and directed a number of poetry films and fantasy short films that have screened at festivals both in Aotearoa New Zealand and overseas. Alfio is the founder and codirector of the Aotearoa Poetry Film Festival.

#### Tyler Shane Tesolin

Tyler was born in Windsor, Ontario, Canada. He studied Cinema and Media at York University in Toronto. Tyler makes films that focus primarily on the intersection between poetry and film. Gwen Isaac is a documentary filmmaker whose work includes the award-winning Where There is Life, Siouxsie & the Virus, and her most recent feature Ms. Information, selected for Whānau Mārama 2023 and FIFO Tahiti. Based in Aotearoa New Zealand, she teaches at Massey University and is currently developing a new feature and a docu-series.

#### Hannah van Seventer

Hannah is an Ōtaki based writer working at the intersection of creative nonfiction and ecological art practice. At present, she is working on a visual research project exploring lithium mining and intimacies in climate crisis. She holds an MA in Art History from Te Herenga Waka.



#### Marco Sonzogni



City of Angles - Imprisoned Lightning Redux

"City of Angles is an experimental short film by Amos Mann shot from the hip one frame at a time in New York City in 1993. The film's fast-paced and fleeting imagery creates a heightened immediacy that connects us to a time from before the authoritarian 'clean-up' of New York in the years that followed filming. City of Angles celebrates the ethos of New York City as a creative and synergistic safe harbour for immigrants, refugees, those escaping oppression and persecution, and those seeking safe space for creative life."

Through the voices of Apollina Smaragd (German) and James Delaney (English), lines such as "words / that always keep us alive" lead us to the threshold of a semantic breath. The film itself takes shape as a living, poetic being that explores those fleeting moments when reality and possibility meet in the blur between breaths."

A poetic meditation on place and the precarity of place-based identities, Settler Trips Home invites reflection on time, space, and build environemnt, questioning our closest attachments.
